Polytypic Cannabis? - A recently published leaflet by R. E. Schultes, W. M. Klein, T. C. Plowman and T. E. Lockwood discusses the polytypic (as opposed to the widely held monotypic) nature of the genus <u>Cannabis</u>. It is a contribution from the Harvard Botanical Museum and explains why they, like the Russian and several English taxonomists, feel that <u>Cannabis</u> has three species. It is available from the Botanical Museum, Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts for \$2.25 and is entitled "<u>Cannabis</u>: An Example of Taxonomic Neglect".

Banner of Pharmacognosy to Visit Mainland China - Norman R. Farnsworth, University of Illinois has been selected as one of a nine scientist "Herbal Pharmacology" delegation to visit the People's Republic of China for the month of June 1974. The purpose of the visit is to exchange ideas on natural product research with the Chinese.

Opium - Dr. Finn Sandberg has advised us of the film "Opium Poppy: An Ancient Producer of Modern Remedies". This 30 minute sound film was shown for the first time at the 33rd International Congress of Pharmaceutical Sciences in Stockholm 1973. It describes production of opium in Turkey and the isolation from poppy straw of morphine and other alkaloids in a modern Norwegian pharmaceutical plant. The film is available for \$400.00 plus postage from Team Film A/S, Keysers Gate 1, Oslo 1, Norway.

Halle Symposium - Professor Dr. M. Luckner has called attention by copies of abstracts to the symposium "Bildung und Umwandlung biologisch aktiver Verbindungen durch Mikroorganismen und horhere Pflanzen".held at Halle October 1973. The Symposium was under the auspices of Pharmazeutische Gesellschaft de DDR, Arbeitsgemeinschaft "Arzneimittelsynthese und Arzneipflanzenforschung" Sektion Pharmazie der Martin-Luther-Universitat Halle, Wittenberg.

Personal - The editor apologizes to Dr. Kazuo Kimura, Vice-President and Scientific Director of Hazelton Laboratories and had duly noted that there is no Kik Kimura, outside of the <u>Newsletter</u>. <u>James Zarucchi</u> (Harvard University) has spent a month in the Biochemical Laboratory, Royal Botanical Gardens, Kew with Dr. T. Swain working on the phytochemistry of Virola. Dr. Carlton Turner, University of Mississippi, has recently returned from Sao Paulo, Brazil where he presented two invited lectures on cardiac toxins of Cannabis roots and analytical studies on Cannabis to the First Annual Meeting of the Latin American Society of Psychobiology. Dr. Leonard Worthen has been appointed Director of the Environmental Health Science Program at the University of Rhode Island. Dr. Rumiko Takahashi has been appointed to a post-doctorate position in the Department of Pharmacognosy at the same institution. Dr. Americo R. Albornoz has been promoted to the rank of Professor and Head of the Department of Pharmacognosy of the School of Pharmacy, Universidad Central de Venezuela. Dr. George P. Hager will resign his position as Dean of the University of North Carolina School of Pharmacy and return to teaching at that institution in the Fall of 1974. Dr. Yaghoub Aynehchi, School of Pharmacy University of Tehran, is spending his sabbatical year at the Pharmacognosy Institute, Uppsala University, Sweden. Professor E. Steinegger, University of Berne, was elected chairman of the Federal Pharmacopeia Commission and of the Swiss Delegation at the European Pharmacopeia Commission by the Swiss Federal Council. Professor Hildebert Wagner, the Institut für Pharmazeutische Arzneimittellehre Munchen, presented an invited lecture on "The Chemistry of the Glycolipid Resins of the Convolvulaceae" at the Nobel Symposium on Chemistry in Botanical Classification held in Liding 8/Stockholm. Professor Wagner has also been invited to present seminars and lectures at the University of Beograd (Yugoslavia), Lyon (France) and at the Pan African Conference on Research into Medicinal Plants, to be held at the University of Ife (Nigeria). Dr. Donald Abraham, University of Pittsburgh, School of Pharmacy, has been awarded a half year Senior Fellowship Award from the Humboldt Stiftung for the purpose of performing research with Professor Wagner and Professor Hörhammer and to teach at the Institut für Pharmazeutische Arzneimittellehre München.

Grants - Dr. Carlton E. Turner, University of Mississippi, has received a

contract of \$127,000 from the National Institute on Drug Abuse for the continuation of his work on <u>Cannabis sativa</u> L. Dr. Yuzuru Shimizu, University of Rhode Island, has recently received two grants: \$13,000 from NIH to study anti-tumor agents from marine organisms and algae and \$108,023 for three years to study the Atlantic Shellfish Poison, <u>G. tamarensis</u> Toxin. Dr. <u>Norman J. Doorenbos</u>, University of Mississippi, has been awarded an \$18,000 research grant for ciguatera research from the Mississippi-Alabama Sea Grant Consortium. Dr. <u>Norman R. Farnsworth</u>, University of Illinois, has obtained a one year renewal of a contract to "Tsolate Active Anticancer Compounds from Natural Products" in the amount of \$90,000 from the National Cancer Institute.
