MARK THURMAN GILL RECEIVES KILMER PRIZE

For the third consecutive year, a Purdue student has been chosen as the recipient of the Kilmer Prize. This year's winner, Mark Thurman Gill, is a Student APhA member and a senior pharmacy student at Purdue University School of Pharmacy and Pharmacal Sciences. Mark's award winning paper was entitled: "3,3',5'- and 4, 3',5'- Trimethylpiceatannols: Improvements over Piceatannol in Bioactivity." His research was conducted under the supervision of Jerry L. McLaughlin, Professor of Pharmacognosy at Purdue.

As the Kilmer Prize winner, Gill received the gold Kilmer Key which was presented at the 1985 APhA Annual Meeting in San Antonio, Texas during the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences awards ceremony on Monday, February 18, 1985. The winning paper was presented during the APS Medicinal Chemistry and Pharmacognosy Section Poster Session on February 19. Congratulations Mark!
